## What We're Up To

It's been a while since the second issue and we've been busy! Engagements of note since April 1 include our Annual Spring Concert, which is becoming quite a tradition in the community. This year, the concert was held at Bay Street Armoury, on April 23, under the red and blue banners of the Royal Canadian Artillery. The festive air was tempered by the death of one of the Regiment's own. We received the news the day before our concert that Bombardier Myles Mansell had been killed while on patrol, in Afghanistan. Our Commanding Officer, Lieutenant-Colonel Ross, used the occasion of our concert to say a few words. The concert was dedicated to Bdr Mansell's memory and was enjoyed by all, featuring not only our band, but the cadet band from the 2289 Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron and the drumline from the 5<sup>th</sup> Field Royal Canadian Army Cadet Corps.

The next week, the drummers of the band marched in Bdr Mansell's funeral procession, and the band was waiting inside Christ Church Cathedral to perform for our fallen comrade. It was a beautiful, if terribly sad, day.

Next, we performed at Ship Point, to accompany the firing of the 21-gun salute at noon on Victoria Day, May 22. As if they were following us, the guns were fired at noon at our next engagement as well, the Canada Day celebrations at Fort Rodd Hill. Despite being one of our hottest gigs, playing in full sun, it was a great day, made even better by cake! Not to be outdone, the Municipality of Saanich rolled out the red carpet for us on the occasion of its 100<sup>th</sup> birthday, July 9.

Our regular concert series at Fort Rodd Hill began on August 6, and the weather permitted us to play all four Sunday afternoons in August this year. As usual, it was difficult to tell whether the audience or the band enjoyed our performances there more. At our second concert, we were pleased to invite a young guest conductor to the podium, namely Anna Slater. She had won the opportunity to take the baton by submitting the best entry in a colouring contest sponsored by the Goldstream Gazette. She did a fabulous job!

For the second year in a row, the band was asked to perform a graduation parade for the candidates of the Raven Programme, a Basic Military Qualification course run by the Naval Reserve for youth in the First Nations community. The parade, on August 25, was attended by Her Honour, Lieutenant-Governor Iona Campagnolo, and featured First Nations dancers as part of the ceremony.

Our annual September concert at the Cameron Bandshell, Beacon Hill Park, was a wonderful way to end our Summer concert season and to welcome the return of our members who were employed elsewhere during the Summer. Several of our numbers contributed their talent to the Band of the Ceremonial Guard on Parliament Hill in Ottawa, while others attended Musician training at Canadian Forces Base Borden. Not only were we welcoming current members home, but we were also welcoming new members to the fold. Privates Emily Albu and Lurene Bates, from Windsor, Ontario and Victoria, respectively, and Corporal Scott MacInnes from Toronto, are transferring to our ranks, and we are very happy to have WO Carl McLean transferring to us from Naden Band and joining our saxophone section (see *In the Spotlight*).

## In The Spotlight

One of the 5th Field Band's newest members, Carl McLean, brings with him 26 years of regular force experience and a wealth of knowledge that has already been an asset to the band.

Carl was born in Quebec City in 1959, and moved to Victoria to learn English when his father was posted to the School of Music in Victoria in 1978. After working as a mechanic for a few years, Carl decided to follow in his father's footsteps and join the regular force as a musician in 1980. Carl worked his way up to the rank of Warrant Officer as a saxophonist, serving in the Naden Band in Victoria, the Royal Canadian Artillery Band in Montreal, the Stadacona Band in Halifax, and returning to Victoria to finish his career. Throughout this time, Carl learned the ins and outs of public relations and administration for the bands and his organizational skills were honed.

When the regular force music programs were drastically cut in 1994, and Naden Band was temporary dissolved, many of the musicians had a sudden wake-up call as to what they might do if they no longer had the job as a Canadian Forces musician. The civilian world of music is highly competitive and doesn't come with a regular salary, so Carl decided to take many of the organization and leadership skills he learned in the military and start preparing for the day he would retire.

After obtaining his Diploma in Real Property Appraisal from St.-Francis Xavier University, the accreditation changed and

certification now required a university degree.

So, Carl spent years completing his Bachelor of Commerce through Royal Roads University, studying on the way to gigs and working on his days off. Before Carl retired he also obtained his Diploma in Real Estate Trading Services to ensure as many opportunities as possible would be available to him.

With several job offers to choose from, Carl retired from the regular force this past August, and is building an excellent client base through his job as a Mortgage Consultant for the Mortgage Centre. Many of the professional skills that he learned in his years in the Canadian Forces have served to make the transition to the civilian world a smooth one and the 5th Field Band is delighted to have him as a new member of our group.
