## In The Spotlight: Sergeant Ameer Bodman

*[Sgt. Bodman is currently the band's Head Librarian and Solo Euphonium.]*

Ameer was born in Victoria, BC, and continues to reside there today. She began her musical career at age 11 where she chose to play the baritone. Though she originally wanted to play the trumpet, she still recalls how her teacher persuaded her to play baritone by telling her it was the “same instrument, just a little bigger”! Ever since then, she has found herself a spot in many bands and is happy she was set on the path to play a unique and uncommon instrument. A few years after beginning on baritone, Ameer upgraded to euphonium, and began teaching herself trombone and tuba, all of which she continues to play.



Currently, Ameer is teaching at View Royal Elementary where she is the Learning Support Teacher - an educator who teaches children with exceptionalities. Her life remains busy as she continues her education by working towards a Graduate Diploma in Special Education at Vancouver Island University. She began her educational career teaching fine arts classes at the high school level. Ameer then took an opportunity to teach elementary music, and finding that she loved the age level, began thinking about changing her teaching speciality to the elementary level.

Most recently, Ameer applied for and was accepted to attend a live audition for a euphonium position with the Regular Force. She is, as of this writing, awaiting formal acceptance and possible job offer.

Ameer joined the military in 2001 when she was accepted into the Band of the Ceremonial Guard, a group composed of musicians selected from across the nation that plays for the Changing of the Guard on Parliament Hill. Concurrently with this, she was earning her Bachelor of Music at the University of Victoria, with a specialization in Music Education. Ameer enjoyed six summers with the Band of the Ceremonial Guard where she also took on the duties of Band Librarian.
